# CAPITAL

Dili is the capital of Timor-Leste. It is located on the island's north coast and has a population of almost 350,000 people.

Timor-Leste is primarily a market economy, with most villages relying on subsistence farming. About 80% of the population is employed in the agriculture sector.

Major exports are oil and gas, coffee and services (remittances) followed by tourism.

### **GEOGRAPHY**

Timor-Leste, previously known as East Timor, occupies the **eastern half** of the island of Timor.

It shares a border with Nusa Tengara Timor.

Australia is the country's southern neighbour, separated by the Timor Sea.

The country's size is about 15,007 km<sup>2</sup>.

### **CULTURE**

The people of Timor-Leste are known for being hospitable, friendly and gregarious.

Society is generally conservative and traditional with a strong focus on family, the community and religion. Timorese culture reflects its Timorese, Portuguese, Chinese and Indonesian influences. This can be seen in its local arts and handicrafts, as well as in its dance, music and poetry.

The 2 official languages of Timor-Leste are Portuguese and Tetun. English and Indonesian are also spoken and considered 'working languages'.

## RELIGION

Catholic

Around 90% of the population of Timor-Leste is Catholic.



### **CUSTOMS**



If you are offered food or drink, it is important to at least taste it but always wait for your host to take the first sip or bite.

Women often cheek or air kiss, usually on both sides of the face.

Shaking hands is common and expected.

Elders, church and community leaders are treated with deference.

Swearing and blasphemy are not common and can be interpreted as offensive or aggressive behaviour.



The traditional textile of
Timor-Leste is known as tais,
which is incorporated into
traditional dress. Styles of
tais worn on the body are
differentiated by gender.
Men wear the tais mane (or
'man's cloth'), which is a single
large wrap around the waist.
Women wear the tais feto
('women's cloth'), which is a
form of strapless dress woven
in the shape of a tube.
